

Fraternity Goes Before the Greek Council Judicial Board

The Social Fraternity of Chi Delta was the first organization to go before the new Judicial Board of the Greek Council. The charges stemmed from a situation where the organization's President, Tim Knarr, acted "inappropriately" towards a member of the CMC administration. The fraternity was found guilty but the case is under appeal.

Pending this appeal, Chi Delta could be put on social probation and be prohibited from participating in Homecoming and/or Greek Week. Social probation may also mean that the organization cannot be funded by CMC, accept any awards given by the school, or represent the school in CMC activities. There is also a chance that Knarr may be asked to step down as the Chairperson of the Judicial Board.

The Judicial Board meets again tonight to decide about charges brought before two more Greek organizations. Though The Collegian could not be told who these organizations were, sources say that Alpha Phi Gamma has been charged with violating quiet hours when they marched as a fraternity after 10:00 p.m. last Wednesday night. The other organization charged could not be determined.

New Technical Coordinator Looks After CMC's Interactive Television Network

J. Scott Christianson was recently chosen as the Technical Coordinator for the new Missouri Interactive Telecommunication Education (MIT-E) network. The MIT-E network is a consortium of schools which have developed an interactive television network to transmit classes between CMC and surrounding high schools. The technical office for the MIT-E network is located on the CMC campus in Cupples Hall

As Technical Coordinator, Scott is responsible for seeing that technical problems with the I-TV network are fixed as quickly as possible. He is also involved in developing plans for the expansion of the I-TV network.

"I really enjoy working at CMC," said Scott. "The students, faculty and staff are excellent and enthusiastic. Dr. Sandy Kinder, whose office is next to mine, has got to be one of the most dedicated and energetic professors I have ever met." Dr. Kinder has been involved in planning the development of the interactive television network for the past three years.

Scott graduated from the University of Missouri-Columbia in 1991 with a degree in biology. Since then he has been working full-time as a biomedical researcher in UMC's Ophthalmology Department, where he is part of a research team that studies the causes of blindness in humans.

Scott has dropped from full-time to half-time at UMC in order to work as the Technical Coordinator forthe MIT-E network. Scott said that even though this means he has to juggle two jobs at once and has lost his University benefits, he couldn't pass on the opportunity to work on such an exciting project.

"I have never been involved in a project that was so innovative, fast-paced, experimental, hectic, exciting and challenging," said Scott. "Even on the bad days-when there are lots of technical problems- I can't think of any other job I would rather have."

Scott explained that he has been involved in educational computer networks for a number of years. He was recently invited to co-author a chapter of a book on the subject of using computer networks in education.

In addition to his interests in biology and computers, Scott is also an active conservationist. He currently writes a column for the Columbia Daily Tribune on environmental and conservation issues.

"Writing for the Tribune gives me the opportunity to show that environmental issues can be addressed in a rational and balanced way," said Scott. In addition to writing for the Tribune, Scott's environmental activities include serving on the University of Missouri's Environmental Affairs Committee and working with several conservation organizations in Missouri.

Scott invites anyone who is interested in learning about the interactive television to stop by the MIT-E Technical Office in Cupples Hall.
